



Joba Murmu (Santhali)







Joba Murmu is a Santhali writer and translator who is a tribal school teacher at Bal Vikas Primary School in Karandih, Jamshedpur. A postgraduate in Santhali literature, she has been writing since 2009. Joba's stories are aimed at empowering tribal women along with informative and entertaining stories for children. In the last two decades Joba has authored more than five books, including translations of works by two iconic literary figures in India - Munshi Premchand and Nobel Laureate Rabindranath Tagore. *Sereng Anjle* (2015) is her translation of Tagore's *Gitanjali*. It received an award the following year from the All India Santhali Writers' Association. For her services to literature, she was awarded the Rabindranath Tagore Award in 2020.


During her college days, Joba was inspired to write by her father, Chote Ram Majhi, who himself is a renowned figure in the field of Santhali art and literature. She calls her husband, Pitambar Hansdah, who had received the Sahitya Akademi award in 2012 for his book of short stories for children, her guiding light. Her short story collection *Olon Baha* (The Imaginary Bloom, 2014) won the Sahitya Akademi's Bal Sahitya Puraskar in 2017. It is a book with moral stories for children. She has also written the script and lyrics of two Santhali feature films, *Tore Sutam* (The Divine Thread, 2015) and *Sagen Sakam* (The New Leaf, 2018).








SANGMU LEPCHA (Nepali)





Dr Sangmu Lepcha is a children's writer based in Darjeeling. She is currently Headmistress, Barnsbeg High School, Darjeeling. With a remarkable background in Nepali Women Authors from Darjeeling, Sangmu Lepcha specialises in crafting female-centric content and captivating children's literature. Her enchanting graphic novel for children, *Shantiban*, published in 2021, is a collection of bird folktales from this region which conveys an important message regarding habitat destruction. It has been translated into English by Denuka Rai and published in 2023. A play based on the book was rehearsed sometime back in Café the Twins. Darjeeling, when children were encouraged to act out the tales. The play was an initiative of "Kathaghar—Nurturing the Young Through Stories and Beyond" and The Nepali Learning

Community—a community that reads curated Nepali books and engages in open dialogue and discussions. The children, although from English medium schools, were keen to learn their mother tongue Nepali. It has been said that Shantiban isn't just a book; it's a portal to enchantment and learning.




RASHMI RAMANI Writer (Sindhi & Hindi)






Rashmi Ramani was born in Indore to parents who had come from Sindh (Pakistan) during the Partition. She was the eldest of five siblings and two of her younger sisters passed away and so she was brought up as a very precious child and given education and not forced into marriage unlike other girls who married at 17 or 18. Very fond of reading, she wrote her first story at the age of 12. But after that writing happened much later in her life. She is a bilingual writer who began to write in Hindi for adults and later was eager to learn her mother tongue Sindhi and learnt the Sindhi script from a woman who had not even passed fourth standard. Apart from folk tales of Sindh which she translated into Hindi as Sindh ki Lok Kathayen (2010), she brought out a book of folk tales in Sindhi, Kaun Ain Jhirki (2017) which got the Sahitya Akademi's

Bal Sahitya Puraskar in 2019. Apart from this she has brought out two poetry collections of simple and small poems for young children to read about birds, rainbows and other things around them. Many of her stories have been selected for animation, drama and stage-work by prominent people and drama groups. Writing about her on Facebook, her daughter recalled that everyday was a new day for her because every night her mother had a new story to tell her. She said her mother had a great memory to remember beautiful stories from her mother, grandmother and even great-grandmother. It was through these small stories by her mother that her daughter learnt about culture, history and qualities like compassion and kindness. A compliment from a daughter is the greatest award for a writer who writes for children and Rashmi has been bestowed with that award by her daughter.







HARSHA SADGURU SHETYE Writer (Konkani)







Harsha Sadguru Shetye who writes under the name of Harsha Shetye, is a notable Konkani author from Goa, recognised for her diverse literary contributions, children's literature being one of them. With a deep connection to the Konkani language, she aims to introduce young readers to Goan culture and heritage through her works, such as Amurchavar (Tender Blossom), Mhoji Mati Mhoje Mollob (My Soil, My Sky), Motyanchi Mall (Pearl Necklace) and Champu in Ranchikud (Champu in the Kitchen). Her other popular books for children include *Jagma* (Indian Plums), *Mov* Mov Jagmam (Soft, Soft Plums), Phullam (Flowers), Bomade (Bubbles), Nuste Jay Ge (Do You Want Fishhh) and Haum Kon? (Who am I?). *Jagma* is a book of poems. *Phullam* is about the various flowers of Goa. *Bomade* is a fun story which triggers the

thought process of a child about bubbles. In *Haum Kon* Harsha sets children thinking with her riddles on vegetables. Mov Mov Jagmam is the story about how a mouse and a squirrel fetch runeala plums for children who savour and relish them. It is based on a song game Konkani children in Goa play where children sing pressing the berry in their hands: *Chanye chanye goad* kar, hundara hundara mov kar (Oh squirrel, make my jagam sweet, oh mouse, make it soft). She has won several awards and in 2024, she received the Sahitya Akademi's Bal Sahitya Puraskar for Ek Ashil'lem Bayul (There was a Girl Child), a children's novel based on her childhood in various moods and activities with historical incidents. She has done extensive research on the region's cuisine and natural heritage particularly its birds and wildflowers. Through her writing, Harsha Shetye encourages the use of the Konkani language at home and inspires future generations to appreciate their linguistic and cultural roots.







NARAYANI SUBRAMANIAN Writer (Tamil)






Narayani Subramanian belongs to Kumbakonam and did her graduation in Biotechnology. Her Master's in Marine Biology and PhD on coral reef fish were done as a research scholar in the Department of Ocean Studies and Marine Biology, Pondicherry University, Port Blair Campus. She is currently concentrating on fisheries research. She has written 15 science books for children and young people in Tamil and has won awards for her science writing. Some of those books are Nirpathuvae, Nadappathuvae, Parappathuvae (All Things That Are Standing, Walking and Flying, 2015) with its title taken from Bharathiyar's famous poem, Kadalum Manitharum, Part 1 and 2 (The Sea and Human Beings, 2022, 2024), Vilangkulaum Paalinamum


(Gender and Animals, 2022), Soozalum Pennkalum (Environment and Women, 2023), Kadaloadu Uravadu (Engage with the Sea, 2023), Aazhkadal Athisiyangal (Deep Sea Wonders, 2023), Aazhkadal Suuzalum Vaazidangalum (Deep Sea Environment and Living Spaces, 2023), Miinkal Paayum Marikadal (Wavy Sea Where Fish Jump About, 2024) and Kadalsaar Suuzhaliyal Katturaikal (Articles on Ocean Environment, 2024). Nirpathuvae, Nadappathuvae, Parappathuvae written in 2015, is a book on environment which talks about hundreds of rare animals. The impact of the book was such that it was felt by some reviewers that the future could be entrusted with people like Narayani. Vilangkulam Paalinamum written in 2022, questioned notions of so-called inborn qualities and biological qualities when it comes to gender. It was seen by many as an enlightening book that destroyed hatred and sowed the seeds of love. Narayani is passionate about making science accessible to the public and enjoyable to children. She calls herself a confused agnostic, a hard-core feminist and a very passionate naturalist.








BANDITA PHUKAN Writer (Assamese)






Bandita Phukan was one of the first women graduates in mechanical engineering in the North-East. She entered the literary world as a translator. But later began to write children's novels in Assamese. Her first children's novel Jumi, Rima aru Xihont (Jumi, Rima and Those Others) became so popular that so far seven editions of this novel have been published. Since then, she has written 40 children's novels out of which ten are science fiction. In 2011, she received the Bal Sahitya Puraskar awarded by the Sahitya Akademi for her children's novel Seujia Dharani (The Green Earth) based on environment. National Book Trust has published her children's novel Kokar Jimi (Grandfather's Jimi) and translations of it in 14 regional languages of India. Amar Chitra Katha, Mumbai,

has published her comic *Joymoti* based on the life of Ahom princess Joymoti Konwari of 17th century, who died a martyr, written in English and translated it into 14 languages of India. After a long career as a mechanical engineer, Bandita is now a full-time writer.







JOYA MITRA Writer (Bengali)






Joya Mitra is a writer-activist, chronicler, storyteller with a passionate wanderlust, wayfarer, friend of everybody and a lifelong student of mother nature. Joya was imprisoned without trial for a long time during the turbulent seventies for being a part of the ultra-left youth movement. Joya Mitra has been a popular writer for the last three decades. She is acclaimed for both fiction and non-fiction literary works. She has more than 32 published works to her credit which include many books for children. Her books for children that have been appreciated are, *Bhalo Rakasher Boi* (Good Monster Book, 2014), *Rupali Beter Jhanpi* (A Basket of Silver Canes, 2019) and *Surjer Niger Gram* (Sun's Own Village, 2022) *Surjer Niger Gram* is about the fiery-


coloured palash tree flowers in the Kurumdi village and it opens beautifully the world of nature to children and young people. Many prestigious awards have come her way. Among them is the Bal Sahitya Puraskar of Sahitya Akademi in 2022 for her short story collection *Char Panch Jon Bondhu* (Four-Five Friends). What she spoke at the Pustakayan Book Fair in Delhi, on 15 November 2022, summarises her urge to write for children. She said: "Childhood is the most promising part of human life. The children possess the capacity to be happy under all circumstances. They have the natural power to believe and to react if they are given the slightest support. That is why, I think, they should be exposed to the most positive thoughts and experiences."







MANDEEP RIMPI Writer (Punjabi)





Mandeep Kaur Rimpi who writes under the pen name Mandeep Rimpi, holds two MA degrees and a B.Ed. degree and is a primary school teacher at Ropar, Punjab. Mandeep has two poetry collections to her credit: Jadon Tu Chup Si (When You Were Silent, 2020) and Chuhi Nu Bukhar Chadiya (The Mouse has Got Fever, 2020). Her short story collection Kitty Di Kheer (Kitty's Porridge, 2021) was awarded the Bal Sahit Puraskar by Guru Kashi Sahit Academy, Damdama Sahib, in 2021 and has also been recommended by the Education Department of Punjab for school libraries. Han! Main D C Lagna (I Want to become a DC, 2023) is her second short story collection. In 2024 came the novelette for children Rajveer Da Oreo (Rajveer's Puppy, Oreo), which was

featured in Shahmukhi magazine in Pakistan, translated by Ashraf Suhel. Dekhiyo!...Kidre Pul Ka Jayeo! (Lest We Forget!, 2023), recounts the tales of valour of the sahibzades (sons) of Guru Gobind Singh and other Sikh heroes. She has written three acclaimed novels: Zindagi Parat Aayi (Life Has Returned, 2022), Han! Main Lalchi Haan! (Yes! I am Greedy, 2023) and Wagt De Khise Chon (From the Pockets of Time, 2024). Mandeep's love for storytelling was honed further during the COVID pandemic, when audios and videos of her stories were uploaded on YouTube regularly. She has been conferred the Mata Bhajan Kaur Nikkian Karumblan Award in 2025 for her contribution to children's literature.








SANGEETA BARVE Writer (Marathi)







Dr Sangeeta Rajeev Barve has a Master's in Marathi and Ayurvedic Dietics. She is an acclaimed poet but is also very popular as a writer who is recognised for her classic work on children's literature in Marathi for the past more than 25 years. Sangeeta's books in Marathi for children include *Gammat Jhali Bhari* (It Was So Much Fun, 2001), *Raanaphule* (Wild Flowers), *Jhaad Ajoba* (Grandfather Tree), *Kharu Tai and Sawali Bai* (Squirrel and Shadow), *Hurrehup* (Hurry Up, 2010), *Aditichi Sahasi Safar* (Aditi's Adventures, Translated from Suniti Namjoshi's Aditi Adventure Series in English), *Piyu Chi Vahi* (Piyu's Diary, 2017), *Ujedacha Gaav* (Village of Light, 2022), *Nala Damayanti and Other Stories*, and *Pathya Pustakatil Kavitancha Rasaswad* (Appreciation of Poems in Textbooks). Sangeeta has written

and directed Marathi plays for children, which are performed by children in many programmes like "Pulotsav," "Kirloskar Vasundhara Utsav" live on stage and in the form of Musical VCDs like Raanaphule, Gammat Jhali Bhari and Ya Re Ya Sare Gau Ya to name a few. Sangeeta is also a songwriter for films. She has recently scripted a short film Chandana produced by Sagarika Music Co., Mumbai, in which she has also written two songs on the subject of girls' education and their struggle in life. Sangeeta was conferred with Maharashtra Sahitya Parishad's Ga. Ha. Patil Award for her exemplary work in children's literature. She is the current chairperson of Amarendra Bhaskar Balkumar Sahitya Sanstha, Pune.







SHALINI MURTHY Writer (Kannada)





Shalini Murthy hails from Udupi in the Karavali region and is an award-winning author recognised for her work in both children's literature and in the social contributions she has done. Her first book, Ajathashathru was an account of the social service done by the late Dr. U Chittaranjan. She then penned 12 children's books in the Kathegala Thorana (Festoons of Stories) series. Her desire to inculcate positive values in children from an early age drives her passion for writing children's stories and producing podcasts. The books feature illustrations by renowned artists, allowing children to colour them according to their imagination. Some prominent awards for Shalini's children's stories include the N D'Souza Award for Children's Stories from the Karnataka

Sangha, Shimoga, and the Karnataka Lekhakiyara Sangha Award for Children's Stories. She contributes regularly to newspapers and periodicals. She has a great commitment to the environment and is known in several circles as "The Green Woman." Shalini Murthy's interest in artistic mediums extends beyond writing, into areas such as oil and watercolour painting and stained-glass designs. She is also a celebrated cook.








GIRA PINAKIN BHATT Writer (Gujarati)







Gira Pinakin Bhatt, who calls herself a housewife when asked about her occupation, has a total of sixty-three books published since 2011. She has written poetry, inspirational books and short stories in Gujarati. Among them, a total of 50 books are related to children's literature. Her books include Activity and Picture books and books on environment and animal world books. Some of her books that have drawn children to read books are *Drau Drau Dabeli Pau* (Drau Drau Dabeli Pau, 2014), *Kone Maaryo Lafo?* (Who Gave A Slap?, 2019), *Bhag Magati Chandpari* (Fairy Who Asked for Her Share, 2019) and *Hakkchche Dhakchche No Maja Maja* (Crow and Elephant Entertain, 2018). One of her children's literature books has been translated into Hindi. Four other books


are in the process of being published. Her books are seen as being vibrant and engaging with captivating stories that transport young minds to a world of not only adventure and learning but also feeling and understanding. Two of her recent books have received much praise. *Elihouse* (2024) has been called a collection of heart-warming stories. It is an anthology of carefully curated tales that touches the heart and celebrates everyday magic. *Patpat Hu Parpoto* (2024) is a vibrant and engaging book for kids that sparks their imagination and fosters a love for reading from an early age. Both the books have been seen as must-have additions to home libraries. Gira has received many awards. In 2020, her book, *Kone Maaryo Lafo?* (Who Gave A Slap?) received the second prize from Gujarat Sahitya Academy. In 2023, she received the Anju Narshi Gurjar Children's Literature Excellence Award for overall contribution to children's literature. In 2024, she received the Bal Sahitya Puraskar of Sahitya Akademi for her book, *Hasati Haveli* (Merry Mansion).







G KALAYARASSY Writer (Tamil)





G Kalayarassy a native of Karaikal, has settled down in Puducherry. She retired from State Bank of India. She has written and translated books for children in Tamil, seven of them published by the Tamil Nadu Text Book Corporation, under the Tamil Nadu Government's 'Ilam Thalir Ilakkiya Thittam', a programme meant for taking children's literature to government school children. Among her well-known novels for children are Manthirakkudai (The Magic Umbrella, 2021), Neelamalai Payanam (Journey to the Blue Mountain, 2022), Peithottam (A Garden of Ghosts, 2023) and Bootham Kaakkuk Puthaiyal (Treasure Guarded by a Goblin, 2022). She has also written

biographies of Kittur Rani Chennamma and Periyar for young people apart from writing essays on international children's cinema entitled En Appavin Dragon (My Father's Dragon, 2024) and many other story books for children to read. Her *Manthirakkudai* novel translated into English as Magic Umbrella (2024) by N Kalavathy is a delightful and adventurous story about a young girl who discovers a magical umbrella that allows her to fly. This engaging book not only entertains children with its magical elements but also educates them about the wonders of wildlife and the importance of respecting nature. Neelamalai Payanam translated into English as Journey to the Blue Mountain is an unusual adventure novel about three boys and a girl on an expedition to the Nilgiris looking for a plant species, long thought to be extinct. It is currently in print. Besides promoting children's reading habits, she collaborates with the editorial team of the https:// chuttiulagam.com (World of Kids) website and contributes to *Poonchittu* (A Tiny Bird) children's monthly e-magazine.








ANITA AGNIHOTRI Writer (Bengali)






Anita Agnihotri belongs to Kolkata. Her literary oeuvre spans across all genres - poetry, novels, short stories, writing for children and critiques of development. Anita started writing as a child. Her first poem was published in *Sandesh*, the children's monthly, edited by the film maestro Satyajit Ray. Anita joined the Indian Administrative Service in 1980. She served as a Secretary to the Government of India before her retirement after a career in Civil Service spanning three and a half decades. Anita has authored over five volumes of children's stories. Some of her books include, *Akim O Porikonye* (Akim and the Fairy's Daughter, 1993), *Akim O Dwiper Manush* (Akim and the Island People, 2004), *Akim Niruddesh* (Akim Missing, 2004), *Ratan Master er Pathshala* (Ratan Master's School, 2004), *Bandi Rajkumar* (The Imprisoned Prince, 2004), *Joyramer Sinduk* (Jairam's Box, 2006), *Ebu Gogo* (2009), *Chhotoder Galpa Samagra* (Collection of Children's Stories, 2012) and *Chhotoder Galpo Mela* (A Fair of

Children's Stories, 2020). *Gachera Gelo Berate* (The Trees Have Gone for An Outing, 2023) and a collection of children's stories are two of her recent books. What Anita writes for children are real stories of real lives, of forests, rivers, animals and birds







ERODE SARMELA Writer (Tamil)





M Sarmela Devi, who writes under the pseudonym Erode Sarmela, is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Tamil, Kongu Arts and Science College, Erode. She writes stories for children and young people in Tamil and is also an avid storyteller. Two of her stories are part of the book *Hundred Best Children's* Stories edited by Sugumaran, published in 2025. Among her books which are very popular with children are Maghizini IFS (2022), Mandira Sankum Pappu Kuttiyum (Magic Conch and Pappu Kutti, 2023), Thunichalkari (The Brave Girl, 2024), and Aandhaiyum Marngkothiyum (The Owl and the Woodpecker, 2024). One of her stories "Evan Sonnathu Rajannu" (Whoever Said I Was the King) was chosen as a story for promoting the Tamil Nadu School Education Department's 'Vasippu Iyakkam'

(Readers Club) in 2022. Yet another story "Kodai Kuthoogalam" (Summer Fun) has been selected and published by the Tamil Nadu Text Book and Educational Services Corporation (TNTB & ESC) in 2024. Her novel Thunichalkari, a novel for teenagers, has been translated into English by Viji Ravi as *Nila the Brave*, and published in 2025.







SHRADDHA TRIVEDI Writer (Gujarati)





Shraddha A Trivedi, a retired professor, lives in Ahmedabad writes in Gujarati and has always been interested in children's literature. She took up the subject 'Form and Development of *Bal Katha* in Gujarati' for her doctorate. She has several books on children's literature to her credit. She has so far written 13 Children's story collections, 3 Children's drama collections and 30 edited books of children's literature. Her books like *Ting Ting Tirring* (2013), in a set of 5 volumes, *Zip Zap Zoom* (2013) written in a set of five volumes, *Akbar Ane Lilo Godo* (Akbar and the Red Mouse, 2014) in the Akbar-Birbal series, and *Mithubhaini Mithi Vato* (Mithubhai's


Sweet Words, 2014) were eagerly read by children. *Majano Vartakhazano* (A Treasure Trove of Story Entertainment, 2013) is a translation of Sudha Murty's children's stories and *Khushino Janmdivas* (A Happy Birthday, 2024) is a translation of Prakash Manu's children's stories. She also has written a book of Russian folk tales that she has edited and rewritten. *Pavitrata Na Paya Par* (When Perfection Eludes, 2014) is a translation of Sudha Murty's *House of Cards*, a novel meant for teenagers. Shraddha has received several important awards for her books. Two of her books *Chhammak Chhallo* (1989) and *Pahelun Inam* (First Prize, 1991) have won the NCERT awards in the years they were published. She was conferred the Gujarat Sahitya Academy awards for *Chalo Ramie* (Let's Play, 1994), *Durgano Dipak* (Durga's Dipak, 1997) and *Char Chatur Natyamala-Birbal* (2000) in the years the books were published. The Sahitya Akademi's Bal Sahitya Puraskar came in 2013, for her contribution to children's literature. After this came Shri Jambha Jhala Special Award (2017) for outstanding contribution to the field of children's literature in the second decade of the 21st century and Anju Narshi Gurjar Children's Literature Excellence Award for overall contribution to children's literature (2023) making her one of the most popular writers of children's literature in Gujarati.







VARSHA GAJENDRAGADKAR Writer (Marathi)







AMBAI Writer (Tamil)





World collections of stories, in 1998. She has also translated some stories from English into Tamil. She is currently the director of SPARROW (Sound & Picture Archives for Research on Women).



DEEPA BALSAVAR Writer. Illustrator (English)










KHYRUNNISA Writer (English)







MAMTA NAINY Writer (English & Hindi)







SHRUTI SRIDHARAN Educator & Theatre


VIBHA RANI Writer. Theatre. Storyteller (Maithili)






Vibha Rani is a veteran writer, theatre practitioner, folk presenter and an actor. Apart from her original literature writing in Maithili and Hindi, she has brought the oral tradition of Maithili folk culture into print and performance for children. She has collected folk tales of Mithila and published them under the title of Mithila ki Lok *Kathayen*. Another project of hers is to collect the stories of Gonu Iha who was a ready-witted character and a contemporary of the King of Mithila in the 13th century CE, who is also known as Birbal of Bihar, and have them published through Vani Prakashan. Some of the stories of Gonu Iha were enacted by children from her solo theatre classes. Other folk tales of Mithila have been published online


NEHA SINGH Writer. Theatre. Film maker (English & Hindi)







SANDHYA RAO Writer (English and Hindi)





STORIES TO KEEP CHILDREN AWAKE

Dreaming the Meet

That was the theme of the Women Writers' Meet held this year from 29th April to 1st May 2025 at Green Hill Villas in the Bapsai village in Kalyan. When we planned the Meet we did not realise what a learning experience this Meet was going to be for us in SPARROW.

Four months before the Meet we began our work by trying to identify writers who wrote for children and young people, going through Sahitya Akademi's Bal Puraskar awards. through writers we knew already and through word of mouth. It will not be an exaggeration to say that what followed was voracious reading of books, poems and stories followed by emails, WhatsApp messages, inbox messages, and phone calls. We were speaking to writers who wrote in Nepalese, Sindhi, Punjabi, Assamese, Khasi, Mizo, Bengali, Kannada, Maithili, Hindi, Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, Marathi, Gujarati, Konkani, Santhali and English from different regions ranging from Darjeeling to Thiruvananthapuram, who knew nothing about SPARROW and were convincing them to come for a Meet which we told them they would enjoy. We were also contacting theatre practitioners and story tellers who worked with children and illustrators who drew for children's stories.

Much to our relief and joy almost everyone we contacted agreed to come although a few could not make it and a writer who wrote for children in Khasi was a man! Kynpham Sing Nongkynrih, is a well-known writer and a SPARROW awardee, who writes in Khasi and English. He said he would love to come but will not be able to change his gender! But he did suggest Rimi Nath. Rimi had written a story for children in English with Meghalaya as background but it had not been published. So, we had to leave her out. Then we found Amabel Susungi who had worked on Khasi lullabies and had brought out a book entitled On Mother's Lap. And what was more, she was also a singer! She was excited about coming but had a programme in Delhi and the dates of the Meet did not suit her. And we could not get anyone from Mizoram either. We had identified Cherrie Lalnunziri Chhangte who teaches at the Department of English, Mizoram University,

Aizawl, whose areas of interest include poetry, folk literature, and culture studies. Her book The Blaft Book of Mizo Myths is a fascinating work but we could not get through to her. We knew about a PhD scholar, Hannah Lalhlanpuii, in the Department of English, Mizoram University, Aizawl. One of her areas of interest was children's literature. But the dates did not suit her and she could not come. Another person we really missed was Siri who writes in the name of Dr Siri. A qualified dentist from Telangana, Siri is a prolific and popular writer of children's literature in Telugu. She has been writing for children for the past 15 years also helping blind children perform dance in their school programmes and creating audio books for blind children. We were thrilled when she agreed to come but in the last minute, she could not make it because her child fell ill. Another person who could not make it was Rashmi Narzary who is a Sahitya Akademi awardee for children's literature in English and her many stories including tales from the heart of Bodoland would have added so much to the Meet. But although she had agreed to come, she could not make it due to bad health. However, we were thrilled about the twenty-five people who confirmed their participation and were excited about the Meet!

Then began furious activities simultaneously on four fronts: travel, programme schedule, brochure and posters and banners. Aarti took over planning the travel, and she had a well laid out plan that she worked out with Pooja. In the earlier Meets since the themes were about women's lives and their expression, we had programmed conversations with each writer to cover her life and her work. We wanted this programme

schedule to be different. So, we thought we would put up a few questions to each writer about her writing for children and young people and how she arrived at that particular genre of writing. We also thought it would be fun if there is an anchor person who would read out the lead questions and who would also read questions meant for her and answer them. (Some writers did not appreciate this "fun" approach. We heard a bit of grumbling, but never mind, it was something different and a good attempt at trying a new way of interacting and fun as far as we were concerned.) We also put into the programme a reading session where each writer would get to read a portion of her story or her poem in the original language with the translation on the screen. We thought it would be wonderful to involve the illustrators and theatre artists in a workshop with children. So, an Interactive workshop with 25 students of Zilla Parishad School, Bapsai, to encourage them to sing, dance, tell stories and draw was put into the programme schedule. Their principal, Sunita Dinesh Avhad was very enthusiastic about the workshop and this made the detailing of the workshop easier.

All SPARROW Meets are planned with films and this time we chose films involving children. The films chosen were *Chakori* which tells the story of a girl who learnt how to ride a bicycle and how her life changed after that, the 1954 classic *Boot Polish*, which depicts a young India in the years following Independence trying to deal with its young population needing education, *Suman*, a FTII Diploma film, which talks about the passage from adolescence to youth, *Chatpat Chunmun*, who outsmarts boys who refuse to play with her, films from Meena

UNICEF Animated Series that bring out right to education, son preference, dowry, nutrition, health care and other issues concerning girl children, Mere Appa, about a rare moment of closeness between a 9-year-old boy and his father, Nil Battey Sannata about a single mother and her dreams for her daughter and Sesham Mike-il Fathima which narrates the story of Fathima Noorjahan, a young Muslim woman from Mallapuram, who aspires to become a football commentator. We added our usual Hot Chocolate sessions in the night where we really serve hot chocolate, as part of the programme schedule. (One of the participants said later that serving hot chocolate at night was not a good idea as it was not healthy but the entire SPARROW team loves hot chocolate and we really can't give up on our Hot Chocolate tradition that we follow in all the Meets!) As always, the Hot Chocolate sessions were to discuss important issues and questions that arise from the Meet like writing in mother tongues and translations and issues that are related to them. Like our earlier Meet in Mizoram, we programmed not one but three book releases: Two Tamil novels Neela the Brave by Erode Sarmela, G Kalayarassy's Dinosaur Sonna Kadhai (A Story told by a Dinosaur) and Neha Singh's Hindi novel, Nikki, the Detective. And who else could we invite to release the books except our dear Dr Charanjeet Kaur, one of our trustees and a friend of SPARROW? We put her name in the schedule so she cannot say no! Before the programme schedule could be done and sent, we first needed a logo to begin the whole thing. We tried several ways of doing it through AI but found the created logos wanting. Fortunately for us, Madhushree came forward

and she designed a beautiful logo that fitted the theme perfectly.

Along with the programme schedule there was the task of getting the publications of the various writers and parcels began to come regularly. Each book that came got added to the list of readings we were already doing and non-stop WhatsApp messages running late into nights went back and forth between Pooja, Sharmila and CS Lakshmi about choosing what to translate for the brochure which we inevitably plan like a book to keep. Translations were done and edited and reedited and we also took the help of other generous friends Dr Rajshree Trivedi, a writer and also Principal of Maniben Nanavati Women's College. While the brochure was being prepared the posters were being designed by Manik Sonkar with Pooja pursuing the writers for resumes and searching the web for extra details on the writers, and the entire library team with Sayali, Lata, Namrata headed by Sharmila, checking the short notes on the writers. Once the posters were done there were the banners to do. This time we planned really big banners and every time a banner was printed and brought there was great excitement. Meanwhile Asmita, Aarti, Pradeep and Pramod got busy with purchasing bags from an NGO and buying note pads, pens and special snacks of Maharashtra to put in the bags and drawing note books, charts, acrylic and water colours and brushes and colour pencils for the school kids.

In the earlier part it was said that we were planning on four fronts. Actually, it was five. We were also going to film the Meet as we always did. We approached our filmmaker friend R V Ramani who had worked with us for filming the Mizoram Meet. He readily agreed and lights

and mikes and other things needed for the filming of the Meet had to be arranged too.

The Meet Happens!

Since we had organised a Meet successfully in Aizawl, Mizoram, 2023, we thought this Meet would be a cakewalk for us. It was not! After initial plans to have the Meet at Dharamshala which got aborted due to various reasons although it involved a good trip to Dharamshala to be with our Buddhist nun friend Ven Tenzin Paldron at the Thosamling Nunnery, we had to make different plans. Other places like Shillong and Guwahati were also considered but did not work out. Then began a desperate search for an ideal location around Mumbai. Aarti, enterprising as always, visited many resorts and reported and since many things had to be taken into consideration including the budget, a second round began with Pooja, Aarti and CS Lakshmi which finally led us to the Green Hills Villas in Bapsai and its wonderful owner Mukesh and his wife Kamini. But budget was still an issue. That is when generous friends, whom we have acknowledged at the end of this report, stepped in to help us. Once the venue was decided all other plans about food, menus, ways to have fun and also do serious work began to take shape. Menus were discussed with Mukesh and Kamini who wanted to give us the best of Maharashtrian food and also other food. Coordinating the travel plans and getting everybody to Bapsai was now the most difficult part. But it was somehow done successfully with a few minor glitches. As the first group arrived and we gave the welcome drink we knew the Meet had started and a lot

of work lay ahead! As various groups arrived and we saw their happy faces, we were sure everything would go well and it did.

In all our Meets we make room sharing arrangements in specific ways. We see to it that different language writers share a room so that they have space to communicate and discuss after the Meet hours. It has always worked well. This time writers from two languages refused to cooperate. They decided to share their rooms with their own language writers which upset us somewhat but we let it go and did not want to make an issue of it. But we decided never to allow this in our forthcoming Meets.

The sessions started on the first day with Shruti Sridharan singing a song composed by her grandfather, V V Sadagopan, for children. All the sessions went wonderfully well with writers speaking from their hearts and enjoying the food with different menus with no complaints. One could feel the warmth, affection and camaraderie that was filling the air. At times it was so palpable that one could feel it in one's body. Particularly wonderful was the play that Vibha Rani, Lekha Rai Deepa Balsavar, Neha Singh, Madhushree and Shruti Sridharan put up for the children and the songs that Sangeeta Barve made children sing. The children enjoyed the play about a lion entering a palace immensely and also loved drawing whatever they wanted with help from Madhushree, Deepa Balsavar and others. Then there was the dance performance of Aarohi, Pooja's daughter, which enthralled everyone.

Everyone forgot about the hot weather during the Meet, and at the end of the day before the Hot Chocolate session many jumped into the swimming pool to cool themselves.

The last day celebrations went on quite late ending with a rain dance facilitated by the many showers fixed on poles on the open roof space near the swimming pool. Everyone got drenched and screamed and shouted calling an end to the Meet.

Thus ended a wonderful Meet which has given SPARROW many friends and well-wishers.
